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EXTRACT FROM GENERAL PREFACE.

As far as the Author is aware no systematic catalogue of Heraldic Insignia at the present time in the Churches of Yorkshire has been printed. It is his object to supply this want, hence it follows that such facts as are recorded will take a catalogue form.

The Churches, whether containing objects of Heraldic interest or not, will be found placed in alphabetical order, under their respective wapentakes, and where these are divided, as Osgoldcross for example is, a separate section will be given for both divisions. The date of the Author's latest visit to each Church is subjoined.

The position the arms, etc. occupy within or upon the building, furniture, or monuments, as well as the mode of treatment, whether carved, painted, or tinctured by lines, will be briefly described, and such description followed by genealogical facts gathered from the monuments. Every coat of arms will be described once for each Church, and the name of the family to whom it pertains added in italics; if it should occur more than once it will be referred to by this name alone.

Wherever the tinctures are not upon the original,

either from design or defacement, they are added in a note, and a letter indicating the authority placed immediately after; a list of these authorities will be found at the commencement. In a few instances in the descriptions, there is some reason to believe the original colour does not now appear, owing to the effect of weather and time; in such cases the proper tincture is added in a bracket. Those arms not to be found in the copy of "Burke's General Armoury," used for the purpose of the work, have a † placed after the name. A few churches will have, in the the same way, an * affixed, these the Author has not personally visited, but has reason to suppose the information supplied to him is correct. In a few instances genealogical notes will be found printed in italics. These, taken chiefly from "Foster's Yorkshire Pedigrees," are intended to illustrate the correctness of names assigned to the arms.

PREFACE TO PART V.

The present part although containing the Heraldry of a densely populated district of vast commercial importance is, as far as its Churches are concerned, very sparsely endowed with Heraldic Insignia. For while within this district of Upper Agbrigg there are 45 Churches, only 4 of these are ancient, the remaining 41 being the outcome of Churchmen's efforts to provide for the tide of a rapidly increasing population, and is in itself no slight monument of earnest zeal. The Parish Church of the town of Huddersfield contains nothing older than 1570, and scarcely anything prior to 1800, so that the Herald must place before it the series of tombs of the family of Beaumont at Kirkheaton, and the pre-Reformation shields of Kay, at Almond-bury.

It may at first sight seem unwise to issue so small a part, but the Author has been led to do so, in order to give a practical proof that the work is progressing. It is intended, if possible, to issue Part VI. in the early autumn, which will probably contain the whole district of Claro.

The Author's warmest thanks are due to the kind aid rendered to him by Mr. G. W. Tomlinson, F.S.A., of Huddersfield, who most generously placed his notes on the Churches of Huddersfield, Kirk Burton, and Kirk Heaton, entirely at the Author's disposal.





(September 20th, 1892).

In the Chancel—

1. The following ecclesiastical emblems, are upon shields on the modern Reredos.

A club (St. James the Great).

A sword (St. Paul).

Two keys in saltire (St. Peter).

A pilgrim's staff erect in pale, betw. a water gourd and an escallop in fess (St. James the Less).

- 2. The Hood mould of the chancel arch terminates in shields, each charged with a cross throughout possibly for St. George, or the family of Vesci.
- 3. There also occurs an uncharged shield and another charged with two bendlets (Kay, or Kaye).
 - B. gives Arg., two bendlets, sa. for Kay.

- 1. Az., a crosier or episcopal staff in pale arg., ensigned with a cross pateè or., surmounted by a pall throughout of the second edged fringed gold, and charged with four crosses formées-fitchées sa. (See of Canterbury.)
- 2. Gu, two keys in saltire the wards upwards, arg., in chief a royal crown, ppr. (York Modern).

See Wood. Eccl. Her. p. 190-191. These arms are there stated to have been first used by Archb. Robert Waldeby, 1397-1398, but in place of the crown the papal tiara appears but the modern coat was used by Archbishop Bowet 1407-1423.

3. Arg., on a saltire gu. two keys in saltire wards upwards, or. on a chief of the second a paschal lamb ppr. (See of Ripon).

from the seal of the Abbey of Saint Wilfred. at Ripon. The keys from the See of York.

Mr. Wilkinson d. in 1727, and was succeeded by his son, John, who d. unmarried in 1736, when the property devolved upon the heirs of his sister Ellen, wife of Sir John Lister Kaye, of Derby Grange, who had predeceased him.

2. Monument to Elizabeth Horsfall, wife of the above William; she d. April 21st, 1793.

3. Mural monument to Dorothy, wife of Robert Bill, Esq., and eldest dau. of William Horsfall, Esq., who d. 16th May, 1792, aged 42.

KIRKHEATON ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST.

1. In the choir is a monument to Georgiana, wife of the Rev. Christopher Alderson, M.A., and dau. of John Peel, Esq., of Pastures House, near Derby, b. 12th October, 1801, and d. 6th Feb. 1850. The Rev. Christopher Alderson, 44 years Rector of this parish, was b. 30th August, 1802, and d. Sep. 11th, 1880.

Arms, Az., a chev. engr. erm. betw. three suns in splendour (Alderson) imp. Arg., three sheaves of as many arrow ppr., on a chief az. a bee volant or (Peel).

B. gives the arrows as banded gu.

2. On another to Joseph Walker, Esq., who d. April 10th, 1774, aged 65. He m. Rachel Kitson, who d. 30th April, 1777, aged 56.

Arms, Arg., a chev. betw. three crescents sa. (Walker) imp. Sa., three lucies in pale arg. on a chief or. a lion ramp. gutté d'or, betw. two pellets each charged with a martlet (Kitson). Crest, a demigriffin wings elevated (Walker?)

Kitson is not given in B. nor the crest of Walker in either B. or W.

3. On another monument to Samuel Walker, Esq., of Lascelles Hall, who d. 24th January, 1809, aged 62, son of the above.

Arms as 2, without imp. a crescent.

4. On another to Ann Charlotte, wife of the Rev. George Alston, B.A., Curate of this parish, and dau.

fo the late Sir Henry Oxenden Bart., of Broome Park, co. Kent. She d. 28th June, 1841, aged 35.

Arms, Ten stars of six points four three two one (Alston) imp. A chev. betw, three oxen (Oxenden).

B. gives Alston as az., ten stars in pile or., and Oxenden as arg., a chev. gu. betw. three oxen sa.

5. On another to the Rev. Thomas Clarke, M.A., Rector of Kirkheaton and Swillington, and Prebendary of York, who d. Nov. 25th, 1756, aged 80.

Arms, Az., three escallops in pale or. betw. two flaunches erm. (Clarke) imp. Per fess arg. and sa. a fess embattled and counter-embattled betw. three birds all counter-changed (Thompson?)

6. On another in memory of Martha, wife of Frederick Greenwood, who d. 23rd June, 1858.

Arms, Sa., a chev. erm. betw. three saltires arg. Crest, a demi lion ramp. or. holding betw. its paws a saltire (Greenwood).

7. On another to Robert Henry Tolson, of Oaklands, d. 21st July, 1888, aged 69, son of James Tolson, of Greenhead, in the Parish of Kirkheaton.

Arms, Vert., a rose arg. on a chief engr. or. two martlets az., all within a bordure erm. charged with four pellets betw. as many annulets sa. (Tolson).

8. On a hatchment in the north aisle is painted, Per fess gu. and sa., a fess erm. betw. two lions' heads erased or. in chief, and a dolphin embowed ppr. in base (Senior) imp. Sa., a wolf salient or. in chief three

mullets of six points arg. (Wilson). Crest, a leopard couchant guardant ppr. crowned or.

Joseph Senior, of Dalton Lodge, b. 2nd July, 1796, d. 31st July, 1854.

9. On a white marble monument in memory of Thomas Dickins, d. 23rd Sept. 1692, aged 69.

Arms, Erm., a cross flory (*Dickins*) imp. a chev. betw. in chief two eagles displayed and in base a mullet.

B. gives Dickins Erm., a cross patonce sa., a Staffordshire family. Dicking bore the same coat, but a cross flory.

The nearest coat to the imp. given in P. is that of Johnson of Goldington, Beds., viz., Az., a chev. betw. in chief two eagles volant and in base a sun or.

In the Morning Chapel formerly belonging to the Beaumonts of Whitley Beaumont.

- and armed az. within an orle of crescents of the second (Beaumont) imp. Arg., on a chev. az. betw. three quatrefoils slipped per fess gu. and vert., as many bezants (Wiggins).
- 11. Beaumont, in pretence Arg., on a bend engr. sa. three fleur-de-lis of the field (Holt).
 - 12. Beaumont qu. Holt.
 - 13. As 12.

14. On a fine Jacobæan monument to Sir Richard Beaumont, popularly known as "Black Dick," who d. 20th October, 1631, aged 58.

Arms on either side of the inscription—

- (a) Beaumont.
- (b) Quarterly I. Beaumont. II. Sa., a fret arg. over all a label of three points (Harrington). III. Barry of seven arg. and gu. (Multon). IV. Sa., a fret or. semy of fleurs-de-lis (Morville). V. Arg., a cross patonce sa. (Banester?) VI. Sa., three lions pass. arg. (English). VII. Gu., a saltire arg. (Neville). VIII. Sa., on a bend arg. three mullets gu. (Clifton?) IX. Arg. a cross ragully gu. (Laurence?)

There appears to be some mistake about these arms probably arising from the marriage in 22 Henry VII. of Richard Beaumont to Elizabeth, dau. and co-heiress of Sir John Harrington, of Hornby Castle, but there was no issue to this marriage.

- 15. The same shield and quarterings occurs in the east window of the Chapel.
- 16. On a marble monument to Richard Beaumont, of Whitley Hall, Esq., who m. Frances. dau. of Sir William Lowther are the arms of Beaumont imp. Or., six annulets in pile sa. a mullet for difference (Lowther) and surmounted by the crest of Beaumont, viz., a bull's head erased quarterly arg. and gu.

Mr. Beaumont d. 1st March $169\frac{1}{2}$, aged 38.

17. On the monument to Richard Beaumont, who d. 27th June, 1704, are the *Beaumont* arms and crest, as before.

This monument was erected by his widow, Katherine, only dau. of Thomas Stringer, of Sharlston, Esq., who m. secondly Thomas, Earl of Westmoreland, and d. in 1729-30.

18. On a brass in the floor of the Chapel to the memory of Adam Beaumont, Esq., and Elizabeth, his wife, dau. of Ralph Ashton, of Middleton, Esq., are the arms of *Beaumont* and arg. a mullet sa. pierced of the field (Ashton).



Arms of St. John's College, Cambridge, viz., Quarterly I. and IV. Az., three fleur-de-lis or. (France modern). II. and III. Gu., three lions pass. guardant or. (England) in a bordure compony arg. and az. (Beaufort). The foundress being Margaret Beaufort, Countess of Richmond and Derby.
